


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THE LAW OF SUPPLY

- •Supply is the quantity of a good or service that a producer is willing and able to supply onto the market at a given price in a given time period
- •The basic law of supply is that as the market price of a commodity rises, so producers **expand** their supply onto the market
- •A supply curve shows a relationship between **price** and **quantity** a firm is willing and able to sell

THE SUPPLY CURVE



EXPLAINING THE SUPPLY DECISION


The "quantity supplied" is the amount sellers are willing and able to offer for sale at a single price

The change in the price of the good itself causes a movement ALONG the supply curve


Supply curves normally slope upward. Why?

 Rising prices act as an incentive for producers to expand output – potential for higher profits

AN INWARD SHIFT IN THE SUPPLY CURVE



COSTS OF PRODUCTION

Assuming the price is fixed:


- If production costs rise, sellers are likely to reduce supply, because their profit will be reduced.
- If production costs fall, supply would increase because production becomes more profitable.
- The availability of resources will also affect supply.

INDIRECT TAXES

Are taxes imposed by the Government on spending (VAT and duties).

Such taxes have an affect on supply because they represent a cost to firms.






INDIRECT TAXES

• VAT (value added tax):
is an advalorem
tax. It means that
a percentage is
added to the
price of a good
when sold.


Graph 10: Development of average standard VAT rate, EU-27

INDIRECT TAXES

• Excise duties: are a specific or unit tax. That means that a lump sum is added to the price of a good.



SUBSIDIES

When the Government gives money to businesses in the form of a grant.

May be given to firms to encourage them to produce a particular product.





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
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THE PRICES OF OTHER GOODS
